# Artistic Directors

# DEBORAH HIRSCH

Now in her 8th season with the Houston Pride Band, Deborah Hirsch is originally from Baltimore, Maryland. She graduated from the University of Kansas with a bachelor's degree in music therapy and music education

and earned a master's degree in music at Texas A&M University-Commerce. She also served in the 312th Army Band in Lawrence, Kansas before moving to Texas.

Retiring after 37 years as a band director in Pasadena, Texas, Deborah enjoyed a successful career in public education. Ms. Hirsch was named "Teacher of the Year" in 2014.

As a participant the Colorado University Conducting Symposium in June 2016 Ms. Hirsch studied under Steve Davis, Dr. Donald McKinney, Dr. Matt Roeder and Dr. Matthew Dockendorf. In June 2019, she attended the Conn-Selmer Institute where she was able to study, consult and collaborate with many of her band idols—Dr. Tim Lautzenheiser, Dr. Paula A. Crider, Frank Troyka, Michael Sweeney and Richard Saucedo. In the 2019, Deborah was honored to direct the Association of Private Lutheran Schools Honor Band and the Texas Region 19 Class CC Band. In November 2021, she was the guest clinician for the Texas Region 19 CCC Band and shared the podium at the Bigger and Brighter Conference of the Pride Bands Alliance.

Deborah is an active clinician, judge, and consultant across the state and is a member of Texas Music Educators Association, Texas Bandmasters Association, Women Band Directors International, and Texas Music Adjudicators Association.

Ms. Hirsch is also a member of the chancel choir and bell choir at Bering Memorial United Church of Christ and a long time member of Pasadena Little Theater.

# **DAVID LEA**

David Lea is in his eighth season as a member of the Houston Pride Band, and has served as Co-Artistic Director since 2018. Since joining the artistic team, David has conducted the Houston Pride Band at the

Women Band Directors International conference in 2022 as a featured concert and clinic ensemble, and served on the Artistic Team for the Pride Bands Alliance national conference in 2021. He has also represented HPB as a guest conductor for the Houston Chamber Music Society Wind Project. After bringing two world premiere performances to the HPB Audience in 2023, David is excited to be working with composer JaRod Hall to commission a new work to culminate the band's 45th season.

David is also a founding member of BrassTax, the Houston Pride Band Brass Quintet. BrassTax has performed throughout Houston as a musical ambassador for HPB's outreach initiatives, and will be featured as a guest collaborator this season with Pride Chorus Houston. Outside of BrassTax, David also plays trumpet for the NFL Houston Texans' Deep Steel Thunder.

David currently serves as the Head Band Director and fine arts department chair at Null Middle School in Sheldon ISD. His bands have enjoyed successes at UIL Concert & Sight-Reading Evaluations, and local and regional festivals. As a private trumpet teacher, his students have made Michigan All-state, earned first divisions at regional and state solo & ensemble contests, and had the honor of participating in the Michigan Youth Arts Festival.

David earned bachelor's degrees from Texas A&M and Michigan State University in Psychology and Music Education, respectively. He earned his Master of Music Education from the University of North Texas. His professional memberships include Texas Music Educators and Texas Bandmasters Associations.

# **AMERICAN RIVERSONGS**

American Riversongs begins with a rousing setting of "Down the River", followed by an expansive and dramatic treatment of "Shenandoah" or "Across the Wide Missouri," as it is sometimes called. After a brief transition, a brass band is heard playing a quadrille-like version of Stephen Foster's "The Glendy Burk." As the "Glendy Burk" travels along, a second theme is introduced by piccolo, flutes and tambourine. The second theme is based on a Creole bamboula tune that probably originated in the Louisiana delta region. Other composers have used this melody, including Louis Moreau Gottschalk in his La Bamboula, Op. 2 for piano and his Symphony no. 1, subtitled A Night in the Tropics. The bamboula theme is marked by an incessant syncopated ragtime rhythm and used to good effect in the coda to bring American Riversongs to a rowdy, footstomping close.

## WHERE THE WATERS MEET

Where the Waters Meet was commissioned by the Irving ISD 2019 High School All-City Band in Irving, TX in memory of Lee South (1939-2019), and is based on the British Isles folk tune, O Waly, Waly (the same tune used in The Water is Wide). James South, Lee's son, conducted this piece at the premiere concert in December 2019.

Lee South, former Texas music educator, loved nature, and he enjoyed spending time in the mountains and at his lake home on Lake Fork. He also loved teaching children. Lee felt that humans need two things above all else: to love and to be loved. That was the basis for his teaching; if students did not know you loved them, you would not reach them.

## Carol Brittin Chambers says of Where the Waters Meet:

"As I set out to write this special piece in honor of Lee, I decided to use the imagery of water to portray this particular sentiment: loving students, then truly being able to reach them. One set of waters (a river) meets, or flows into a larger body (a lake). The river is the teacher, and the lake is the body of students. Where the Waters Meet symbolizes the moment or moments when the teacher shows love, gives knowledge, and thereby reaches the students. Lee's principal instrument was the trombone, which explains my choice of trombone solo for the river's opening statement."

#### OF ENDLESS MILES AND EMPTY RAFTS

Michele Fernandez writes of her composition:

"Throughout time and regardless of origin, immigrants have shown a spiritual courage and resolve to survive that has found countless families suffering perilous journeys in search of safety. Many have been lost along the way. As a child of Cuban parents who fled oppression (leaving much behind to build a new life), my respect and empathy for all immigrants runs deep. Although my parents' (still traumatic) exoduses were not by sea, several family members' and friends' journeys were. Throughout my life I have heard stories of near losses and rafts washing ashore, empty. I still recall the feelings since childhood - wondering who they were, and what happened to them.

This piece is in no way intended as a contemporary statement, rather as an empathic look at humanity's struggles to protect innocent families throughout history, and a tribute to my own ancestors' courage. Many of us are descents of immigrants at some point in our deep histories, regardless of era, or origin. During my 30 years as a public school teacher in Miami, I had countless (precious) students who suffered trauma from the dangers of their immigrant journey, and so this original composition honors displaced souls from all eras and walks of life, irrespective of hemisphere - who have fled homes, to anywhere, in search of safety for themselves and their children. The piece is written using two authentic Afro-Cuban forms: Guaguanco and Son Montuno. In this work, many authentic patterns are woven into the fabric of the winds as well. Each brief section represents elements of an immigrant's story:

- 1. Opening Chorale: depicts a treacherous journey, for example, as seas toss about a small raft and its occupants. At the end of the chorale, the listener can almost visualize someone falling overboard and descending into the depths with others still in the raft, crying out with reaching hands as rain and darkness beat down.
- 2. Guaguanco: (3/2 Rumba Clave): a seamless flashback to a memory; this dignified soul at home, living peacefully.
- 3. Son Montuno (2/3 Son Clave): Still a flashback urgency sets in at home as turmoil intensifies into a pursuit, and the courageous decision to flee from danger comes to the forefront. The piece returns to the present (remaining souls) and the intense finale depicts the will of the human spirit to survive and carry on to thrive and contribute, now in their new home- in honor of their lost loved ones' memories and courage."

#### WITH WIND AND WATER

With evidence of watercraft dating back to 8000 BC, travel by water has remained an important aspect of life to many civilizations. From paddling down a river or crossing a large lake, to steaming across an entire ocean, generations of humans have traveled on water to explore foreign lands, to seek food and precious materials, to move and trade cargo, and to attack and fend off enemies.

With Wind and Water is a musical portrayal of an adventure on the high seas during the sailing age. Large sailing vessels dominated global exploration, international trade, and naval warfare during the 16th to the mid-19th century. The piece's compound meter provides the pulse of movement as it pitches and rolls with the rhythm of the waves. The driving main melodies convey the determination and courage of the explorers and their crew. Dissonant harmonies suggest rough seas, turbulent weather, and other constant dangers that sailors must endure. Finally, the ending sweeping melody and climax reflects the joy and triumph at arriving on a new land at the apex of a long and intense voyage.

# PIRATES OF THE CARIBBEAN

This piece covers selections and highlights from the hit movie Pirates of the Caribbean: The Curse of the Black Pearl. Musical selections include: Fog Bound, The Medallion Calls, To the Pirate's Cave, The Black Pearl, One Last Shot, and He's a Pirate.

#### **RIVER POEM**

Rivers have often served as a metaphor for life's journey starting in one place and traveling to somewhere unknown. This metaphor is depicted in a serene and contemplative work that uses a variety of colors and harmonies unique to young bands. Opulent mallet parts interact with optional piano to depict water gracefully cascading downwards. Gorgeous!

## STORM SURGE

Storm Surge is a grade 4 work inspired by a recent trip to the coastal regions of the United States, whose defining characteristic is the utilization of composite time signatures. Also known as complex time signatures, these meters do not fit into the more conventional simple (like 4/4 or 3/4) or compound (like 6/8 or 9/8) time signatures. These time signatures are used to create unique rhythmic patterns and can often be found in contemporary, jazz, and progressive music. In this piece, the composite time signature alternates erratically from 3/4 to 6/8, often overlapping both pulses simultaneously. Their implementation in this work effectively represents an incoming storm's unpredictability, intensity, and gradual buildup through complex and shifting rhythmic patterns. In addition, I incorporated polyrhythms to add complexity and a sense of chaos; overlapping rhythms mimic the tumultuous interactions of wind, rain, and thunder.

Consortium leader, David Lea, had this to say about the nature of the piece:

"After a recent trip to New Orleans, I was struck by the evidence of a city with a complicated relationship with water. While celebrating its rich cultural elements of the food, arts, and the thriving community, there remains dilapidated historic structures in Louis Armstrong Park - in ruins from repeated hurricane damage.

While coastal communities draw their identities from water, they also face consistent threats from weather events that become more extreme with the effects of climate change.

Roughly forty percent of the US population lives along coastlines, and each are becoming increasingly aware of the various impacts of climate change. With this piece and consortium, I aim to raise awareness and pay homage to coastal communities, their music, and the elements that significantly contribute to their culture. Moreover, I seek to acknowledge their resilience through climate change as they adapt and strengthen their symbiotic relationship with water and what the tides bring to their shores."

#### **RAIN**

It is difficult to hear the wonderful motion picture song, "Singin' in the Rain" without conceptualizing Gene Kelly and his umbrella, or "Raindrops Keep Fallin' on My Head" without thinking of Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid. So taking these two songs and inserting the great "torch" song, "Come Rain or Come Shine," between them gives the listener an unforgettable medley about three wonderful melodies and their relationship to the pleasant, and sometimes disastrous, condition called rain.

# **EARHART: SOUNDS OF COURAGE**

The legend of Amelia Earhart continues to capture the imaginations of aviators and historians worldwide. Earhart, a pioneer in aviation and in women's rights, began her final journey in the United States and crossed multiple continents. Earhart's final flight is the basis for this musical composition. Following the opening "takeoff," the composer was inspired by the indigenous sounds of the various continents in Earhart's flight path. From a unique fugue inspired by the music of Central and South America to a lyrical statement from the dark continent, the listener is transported on a musical journey that will capture the imagination. Following a dark and powerful percussion statement with Asian overtones, the journey ends not in tragedy but in celebration as the original flight theme returns leading to a powerful conclusion.

# **SIMON HOLOWEIKO**, Guest Conductor

Simon Holoweiko is the Associate Director of Bands at Louisiana State University, where he conducts the Symphonic Winds, teaches undergraduate conducting and graduate wind literature, guides doctoral students minoring in conducting, and directs the Golden Band from Tigerland. Holoweiko joined the LSU faculty following successful appointments at Michigan State University and Martin County High School in Stuart, Florida.

After serving as Assistant Director of Bands at MSU, where his duties included Associate Director of the Spartan Marching Band, conductor of the Concert Band, Spartan Youth Wind Symphony, and teaching courses in the College of Music, Holoweiko completed his Doctor of Musical Arts (DMA) degree in Wind Conducting at Michigan State University as a student of Dr.

Kevin Sedatole. He also holds the Master of Music degree in Wind Conducting from the Schwob School of Music at Columbus State University where he studied with Dr. Jamie L. Nix and assisted with all aspects of the wind program.

Prior to his graduate studies, Holoweiko taught in the Florida public schools as the Director of Bands at Martin County High School (Stuart). At Martin County, he coordinated all aspects of the band program including instruction of the marching band, two concert ensembles, and also founded a curricular jazz band and AP music theory course. He is also the conductor and a co-founder of the Treasure Coast Summer Band Camp in Jensen Beach, FL and is an active clinician. He has presented clinics at both state and national conferences and most recently, the LSU Symphonic Winds performed as a featured ensemble at the 2024 College Band Directors National Association Southern Division Regional Conference.

He holds a Bachelor of Music Education degree from Michigan State University. Holoweiko is an honorary member of Kappa Kappa Psi and holds professional membership in the College Band Directors National Association and the National Association for Music Education.

# Composition Commission

# **JAROD HALL**

JaRod Hall (b. 1991) is a Texas-native composer, educator, and performer. He holds a bachelor's degree in music education from the University of North Texas where he studied conducting with Nicholas Williams and Dennis Fisher. JaRod's bands have received consistent sweepstakes awards at the Texas University Interscholastic League Concert and Sightreading Evaluations, as well as being recognized at the state level. In 2018 and 2019, JaRod's bands at Griffin Middle School earned the Citation of Excellence award, honoring the top two non-varsity bands in the state of Texas. Under his leadership, the R. L. Turner Marching Band in Carrollton, TX received 1st divisions and advanced to the Area Marching

Contest for the first time in almost a decade; his Varsity band at Sam Houston Middle School in Irving, Texas received the unanimous 1st division ratings from all UIL judges for the first time in the school's history; his Varsity band at Hobby Middle School in San Antonio, TX achieved the same feat for the first time in five years.

As a composer, JaRod's compositions appear on the Texas Prescribed Music List, The J.W. Pepper "Editor's Choice" list, and the Bandworld Top 100 list. His composition Lost Woods Fantasy was showcased at the 73rd annual Midwest Clinic in Chicago by the Berkner High School Band composed of the first students JaRod taught as a band director in Richardson ISD. His composition "Silver Fanfare" was selected as a winner of the Dallas Winds Call for Fanfares and "Through the Storm" was selected as the 2021 Barbara Buehlman Prize winner for middle school band - commissioned by David Puckett and the Keller Middle School Band, premiered for Midwest by Robert Herrings the Artie Henry Middle School Band. Additionally, JaRod is a nationwide marching band and WGI arranger and consultant.

JaRod is currently pursuing a Master of Music degree in Composition at Texas State University. He resides in San Antonio, Texas with his wife, Rachel (the smart one in the family) who is a medical student at the University of Incarnate Word School of Osteopathic Medicine.

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
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
