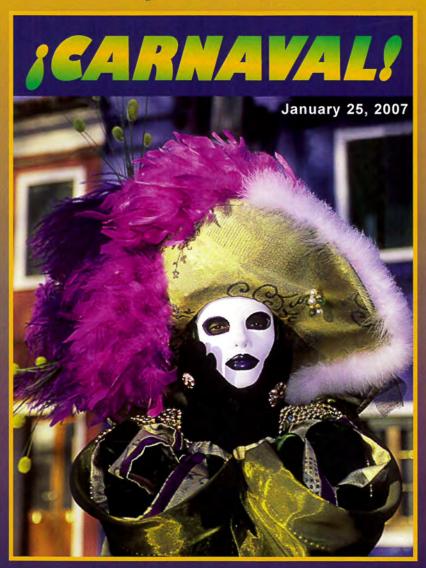

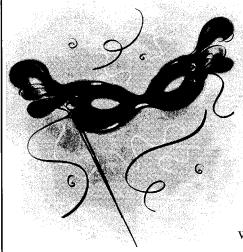

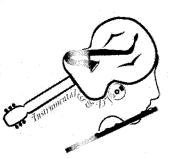

Program Notes

The term *Sol Y Sombra* (Sun or Shade) is a reference to the practice of selling bullfight tickets on the sunny or shady side of the arena with the seats in the shade obviously more preferred. This march by George Gates (b. 1920) beautifully captures the lyrical, lush qualities of the Spanish Paso Doble and the traditional drama of the bullfight.

Brazil, originally Aquarela do Brasil (Watercolor of Brazil) is one of the most noted Brazilian patriotic songs, written by Ary Barroso (1903-1964) on a rainy night in 1939. This song marked the creation of a new genre, Samba-exaltação (Exaltation Samba), which was adopted by the nationalist dictatorship of Getúlio Vargas. The song has been successful through the years and has been played in many different styles, from a capella to orchestral arrangements. It has been covered by many artists, including Joao Gilberto, Chick Corea, Xavier Cugat, Chet Atkins, Django Reinhardt, and Tom Jobim.

The Miller's Dance comes from the ballet entitled El sombrero de tres picos (The Three-Cornered Hat) by Spanish composer Manuel de Falla (1876-1946). The ballet was produced by ballet impresario Serge Diaghilev with the set design and costumes done by artist Pablo Picasso. The ballet is about a governor who has fallen in love with a miller's wife and his attempts to flirt with her. The miller's dance takes place in the second act, while he and his wife are entertaining house guests, and is interrupted when the governor's bodyguard comes to arrest him.

Frank Ticheli (b.1958) is one of the preeminent composers in the concert band genre. His Cajun Folk Songs II (as well as his previous Cajun Folk Songs) was inspired by folk melodies whose precise origins are unknown. The folk melodies in Cajun Folk Songs II are freely combined with original music. The first movement, Ballad, is deeply personal and was written as an elegy, in memory of the composer's father who died in 1996. The second movement, Country Dance, evokes the energetic feeling and style of a Cajun two-step and was written in celebration of the birth of the composer's nephew later the same year.

Alberto Ginastera (1916-1983) was the most distinguished of all Argentinean composers. His ballet *Estancia* was commissioned in 1941 and turned into a dance-suite in 1943. The music depicts a young man from the city who has to prove himself on a ranch in order to win the love of a country girl. *Danza Final* is subtitled *Malambo*, the final proof of manhood (machismo). The malambo is danced only by the men, whose energetic steps are executed 'on the spot' and the 'winner' is the last man to remain standing. The scenario is particularly Argentinean, however, the music is more broadly South American.

Written by Spencer Williams (1889-1965) and first recorded by Louis Armstrong, *Basin Street Blues* is a jazz and blues standard and it commemorates one of the most famous streets in New Orleans. In the lyrics of the song, Williams calls Basin Street "Heaven on earth" and adds that it is "Where [he] can lose [his] Basin Street Blues."

Howard Cable (b. 1920) first came into prominence on Canadian radio as an arranger and conductor for the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. Those radio broadcasts from Toronto were heard throughout the United States, bringing his talent to the attention of the American public. In the early days of Canadian television, he was the conductor and arranger for a variety show, Showtime, starring Robert Goulet. Brazilian Festival is his arrangement for band that includes the well-known songs The Girl From Ipanema (by Jobim and de Moraes), Corcovado (by Jobim), and One Note Samba (by Jobim and Mendonca).

Alfred Reed (1921-2005) was one of America's most prolific and frequently performed composers, with more than two hundred published works for concert band, orchestra, and others to his name. *Second Suite for Band* consists of four movements, each one based on a characteristic song, march, or dance form usually associated with either a single Latin-American country or group of countries.

The first movement, *Son Montuno*, is based on a rhythm closely associated with the calypso, and seems to have had its origin in Cuba or the nearby Caribbean countries. Its basic 2-beat rhythm is performed lightly, and its melodies are also light, vivacious, and delicate in character.

The second movement, *Tango ("Sargasso Serenade")*, is not based on the familiar, highly charged Argentinean version of the tango, but rather the less frequently heard Brazilian interpretation, which is slower, smoother, and dreamier. The beats in the Brazilian version are played almost in a gliding fashion rather than in the emphatic manner of the Argentinean version.

The third movement, *Guaracha*, is a rollicking Argentinian drinking song, in effect a little scherzo, that bounces along its insouciant way to contrast with the preceding *Tango* and the succeeding *Paso Doble*.

The fourth movement, *Paso Doble* ("A la Corrida!"), is built on rhythms associated either with a dance or march and is Mexican in origin (but presumably brought over from Spain.) Though its name translates to "two-step," paso dobles are written in both duple and triple time-either for dancing or marching. This version combines the two patterns into quintuple meter (5/4) in a brilliant march to the bull ring on a festival day, ending with one of those typical long Spanish melodic lines in triple time that suggest both a dance and a march.

Recently the group was the featured entertainment at the Krewe of Olympus Twelfth Night Celebration as part of our partner agreement with the Krewe.

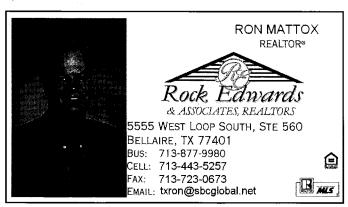

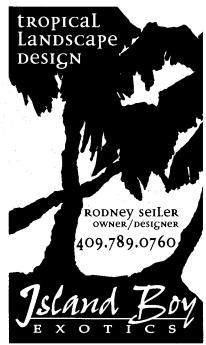

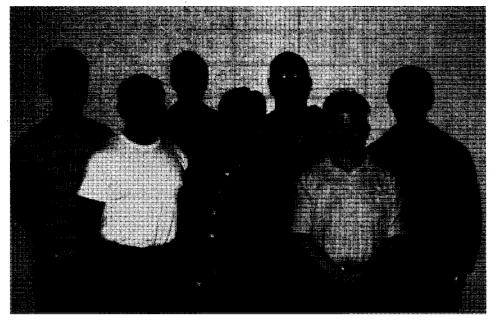
Member bands of LGBA have joined forces to perform for events such as the 1993 and 1997 Clinton Inaugural Parades, every March on

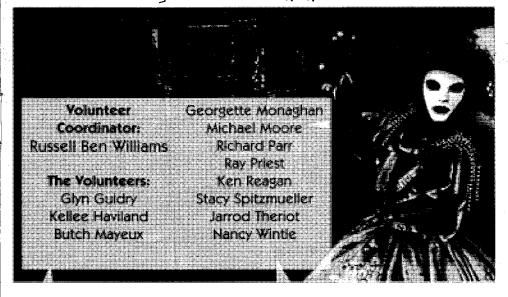
