Onstage, Nancy has performed in theatres, nightclubs, galleries, churches, and dives throughout the U.S. since 1982, appearing with Kate Clinton, Jason Stuart, Judy Tenuta, Janene Garofalo, Lady Bunny, Janis Ian, and innumerable LGBT icons.

artistic director - Skip Martin

Skip Martin is in his third season as Artistic Director of the Houston Pride Band. He holds Bachelor's degrees in Music Education (BME) and Clarinet Performance (BM) and a Master's degree in Music Education (MM), all from Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

As an educator, he served three years as Associate Band Director at Northshore High School (Slidell, LA), six years as First Assistant Band Director at Cy-Fair High School in Cypress, Texas and two years at LSU as a Graduate Assistant. Skip is an active member of the Lesbian and Gay Band Association (LGBA) and served as the Co-Artistic Director for the 30th Anniversary LGBA Conference in Dallas, Texas in September 2013.

Currently, he is the tenor saxophone player for SaxWorx, the Houston Pride Band Saxophone Quartet, who maintain an active performance schedule around the Houston area. He also plays clarinet with the Houston Civic Symphony and is the principal flute of the Cypress Philharmonic.



guest conductor - Karen Schuster

Karen Schuster has been an educator for six years and is currently a middle school band director at a public charter school in Houston's East End neighborhood. She plays flute in both the Houston Pride Band and Shimmer Flute Choir and plays in the percussion section of the Houston Symphonic Band.

She has become an involved member of the Houston Pride Band since becoming a member nearly two years ago. Karen Schuster is the Vice President of the Houston Pride Band and webmaster for the Shimmer Flute Choir. Ms. Schuster holds a Bachelor's Degree in Music Education from VanderCook College of Music in Chicago, where she majored on flute and minored in bassoon and voice.

Despite the increased presence of women on the mainstream classical music scene in the past 100 years, the roles of music composer and orchestral/wind band conductor are still overwhelmingly occupied by men. In the past, the inability to obtain formal music education, social attitudes concerning a woman's place in society, and the resulting lack of self-confidence among women that emanated from those obstacles have prevented so many talented and able women from pursuing a career in music.

As social conventions towards women began shifting in the mid-twentieth century, a new wave of female musicians began breaking down music's gender barriers, slowly joining the ranks of today's musical elite. While their accomplishments and skills are many, this is a slow and arduous process and even in today's society, a strong female presence can only be found in popular music (rock and roll, R&B, etc...). I've no doubt that given time and opportunity, these trends will reach a balance. Today we not only celebrate the amazing contributions that women have made to music but, we also celebrate the contributions that women in music have made to all of our lives. Enjoy!

Inara: Honestly, Mal, if we can't be civilized and talk like . . . Mal: I'm plenty civilized. You're using wiles on me. Inara: I'm using what?

Mal: Your feminine wiles . . . your some-might-say uncanny ability to make me sweaty . . .

From the 2002 film Firefly Percy Grainger (1882-1961) was a piano prodigy turned composer who was known for his strange personal habits,

his colorful prose, and his equally unusual music - his many admirers today still recognize that he possessed "the supreme virtue of never being dull." Born in Australia, he began studying piano at an early age. He came to the U.S. at the outbreak of World War I and enlisted as an Army bandsman, becoming an American citizen in 1918. He went on to explore the frontiers of music with his idiosyncratic folk song settings, his lifelong advocacy for the saxophone, and his Free Music machines which predated electronic synthesizers. His many masterworks for winds include Lincolnshire Posy, Irish Tune from County Derry, Children's March and, of course, Molly on the Shore.

Shoutin' Liza Trombone

by Henry Fillmore edited by John Bentley and Bill Park

Why don't more women play the trombone? ... because women are not wind-bags enough for the instrument

Originally published as *Shoutin' Liza Trombone* to appease the objection of the young Henry Fillmore's father's aversion to the slide trombone and his concern over the inclusion of a quote from Handel's *Hallelujah Chorus*, this trombone "smear" has long been a novelty favorite of bands everywhere. *Shoutin' Liza Trombone*, sub-titled "Mose Trombone's Ah-finity" was written in 1920 and is also known as "Hallelujah Trombone". I believe that the Hallelujah quote which is essentially "shouted" throughout the piece, was written in the style of old-time small church choirs who, despite their small numbers, often created their powerfully loud dynamics by screaming their hymns on pitch.

Constant Craving

k.d. lang, Constant Craving In an interview in MyOutSpirit-Austin Magazine, k.d. lang, a devoted Buddhist, described Constant Craving as a

restatement of Buddhism's first noble truth which is commonly translated as suffering, anxiety, or a craving for more in your current life. She says "I think Constant Craving just comes out of the experience of being human. The realm of desire is such a common theme in my music." The single was released the same year that lang came out as a lesbian to LGBT publication The Advocate. Today's performance is a set of variations based on lang's haunting melody.

Miss Saigon is based on Giacomo Puccini's opera Madame Butterfly, and similarly tells the tragic tale of a doomed romance involving an Asian woman abandoned by her American lover. The setting of the plot is relocated to the 1970s Saigon during the Vietnam War, and Madame Butterfly's story of marriage between an American lieutenant and Japanese girl is replaced by a romance between an American GI and a Vietnamese bar girl.

Nadia Boulanger

Virginia Allen is the Assistant Dean for Orchestral Studies at The Juilliard School, where she also teaches The Art of Teaching in the Music Studio and serves as Artistic Director of the Conducting Workshop for Music Educators. She studied French Horn and conducting and earned a Bachelor of Music Education degree and Master of Music degree in Performance from the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. and a Diploma in Wind Conducting from the University of Calgary.

Allen was a pioneer for women in military bands. She was the first woman to command and conduct an active duty military band that included women, when she was appointed Principal Conductor of the Army's band in Atlanta. As the Associate Conductor of The United States Military Academy Band at West Point, she was the first woman conductor of that historic organization. She also conducted the Army's premier touring ensembles on stages from the Hollywood Bowl to Europe. Her military career included an assignment as the Department of the Army Staff Bands Officer in Washington, D.C., where she managed over 100 Army bands and band activities worldwide.

Women of the Podium is the official march of the Women Band Directors National Association (WBDNA). It was premiered by The United States Army Band on July 8, 1986 during the WBDNA's Summer Meeting in Washington, D.C.


